The DeLoach No. 1 Saw Mill On The Zapalač Ranch And A Final Home At TCHCC



Exactly when this DeLoach saw mill first arrived on the Zapalač Ranch is still a mystery. Based on when the manufacturing company first released their variable friction feed saw mills to the US market, the earliest known dated photographs of the mill being used by the Zapalač Family, and the style of farm equipment depicted in these early photographs, we arrive at a date range of 1887 to 1930. The black and white photo above shows a log-bearing wagon with the saw mill building in the background. The photo dates to around November 1930 and is courtesy of the Zapalač Family. THE SAGA OF THE SAW MILL

Cutting Trees in the Pasture. Before logs were brought to the saw mill, they had to be cut into manageable sized pieces in the pasture. The logs were then lifted off the ground using a homemade winch and placed on the back of a flatbed truck or a wagon attached to a tractor. The Zapalač Saw Mill in Action. The series of photos below show Fred T. Zapalač and a ranch hand Honey Chandler cutting a large log on the DeLoach Mill No.1. The finished product is the large pallet of rough cut lumber stacked to air dry in the last photo. These photos were taken in the early 1960s and are courtesy of the Zapalač Family.



Saving a Wood-Cutting Treasure. The saw mill remained in operation for family use until at least the 1970s. Afterward, it remained inactive for decades with the building slowly starting to collapse around it. By January 2013, the north and south wings to the mill building had completely collapsed leaving only the center portion still standing. Realizing something needed to be done to save this wood-cutting treasure, Donna Zapalač Mueller decided to donate the entire mill and all of its associated parts to the Texas Czech Heritage and Cultural Center. The photo on the right is the front entrance of the saw mill building taken on June 23, 2013.

Extraction of The Sawmill. On November 23, 2013, plans for the saw mill's safe removal were finally put into action. With an all-volunteer crew and lots of heavy machinery present, the saw mill was carefully removed, piece by piece from its collapsing building. In the Spring of 2013, Donna's family donated the mill and all associated parts to the Texas Czech Heritage and Cultural Center to be included in a permanent living history exhibition at the center.



Disconnecting and Loading for Transport. Below left: Part of the volunteer crew, members of the South Texas Wheel Spinners and Crank Twisters Antique Farm Equipment Club, and TCHCC Manager Mark Hermes (also president of the club) moving the table frame of the saw mill to the outside tracks for removal via forklift. A week prior to removal day, Hermes and volunteers oiled all of the metal parts of the mill so the removal process would be easier. Photo courtesy of Stephanie Mueller.

This sequence of photographs shows the blade frame of the saw mill being removed by the volunteer crew. First, the crew loosened any bolts and screws anchoring the frame to the sides of the wooden and cement ditch at the front of the building. Then they wrapped a chain around the center of the frame. Using a small forklift, the crew carefully lifted the frame out of the mill. Once outside, the larger forklift picked it up and lifted it onto one of the flatbed trailers. This sequence of photos shows how the volunteer crew removed the large metal shaft and drive pulley attached to the mill. First, they removed dirt surrounding the piece (below top left). While digging, they realized that the long solid metal shaft continued into the ground towards the fallen corner of the building. The forklift was then used to lift up the fallen roof. As the roof was lifted, two large wooden posts were set in specific places to brace the roof and free the forklift. The crew then removed more dirt and finally found the end of the metal shaft. After unscrewing any bolts and screws anchoring the metal piece to buried blocks of concrete, the crew used the forklift to remove it from the building. As the piece was lifted, it was carefully guided out by several people. The shaft and drive pulley was then placed onto a large flatbed trailer where it was secured by wooden posts at the base and later tied in various areas with tie down securing straps for transport to TCHCC. The Rise of the Small Saw Mill. With advancements in the steam engine and large horse powered technology, smaller, and in some cases more portable saw mills had become a reality. By the 1880s, numerous engine and thresher manufacturers added sawmills to their inventory, often encouraging threshermen to also become lumbermen. One of those encouraging manufacturers was DeLoach Mill Manufacturing Company.

First going by the name W.H. DeLoach and Sons, the company began with developing portable grist mills. By 1880, the company added their newly patented horse powered crop thrasher and water wheel to the inventory. In that same year, the company changed their name to DeLoach Mill Manufacturing Company (continued on next page).

(Continued from page 6.) In October 1887, the company placed the very first full page ad in Southern Cultivator and Dixie Farmer advertising their new variable friction feed saw mill. Described by one buyer as "the simplest and most perfect mill now on the market", the company sold four sizes of mills which were likely the No. 00, No. 0 (the Pony), No. 1, and No. 1 ¼ . The "Pony" saw mill illustrated in the advertisement is boasted to have cut 10,000 feet of lumber per day. Larger sized mills were advertised to cut at a capacity of 50,000 feet of lumber per day.

With this new and improved variable friction feed technology for saw mills, DeLoach soon became very popular brand among the local lumbermen, boasting that by 1889 it was shipping 75 sawmills a month. By 1910, the company had more than 15,000 mills in use across the United States.

Thanks to the Dickson-Allen Foundation the sawmill is now completely funded and used for demonstrations at festivals and scheduled school tours. TCHCC Immigrant Recognition Ceremony 2016

The TCHCC Museum was the site of the Immigrant Recognition Ceremony that recognized the descendants of Czech and Slovak immigrants to Texas between the years 1916-1920 and those whose ancestors came in earlier years. TCHCC Vice President Bill Schovajsa and 2016 Miss Texas Czech Slovak Queen Monika Cavanagh and Little Sister Katie Hyzak (from CHS Travis-Williamson Counties Chapter) presented the certificates.

1916-1920 IMMIGRANT RECOGNITION, May 17, 2016

John Heinrich

John's great grandmother Carolina Horak immigrated in the Spring of 1856 and arrived in Cat Springs from Količin #14, Holesov, Zlin District. Carolina's brothers Josef, Victor and Jan immigrated with her and they all establish themselves in Fayette County, Texas. According to Jan Habernicht, in his book *History of Czechs in America*, page 67 "Josef Horak, born in Količín nearby Holešov, Moravia also is an old colonist. He arrived in Cat Spring in 1856, from there he removed to Fayette County in 1859 and settled close to Praha". An entire chapter in the book *Czech Voices* by C. Machann and J. Mendl is devoted to Jan Horak who states that "they set out for America in December of 1855 from Bremen, after eleven weeks, our shabby sailboat landed in Galveston."

Carolina Horak would marry Ernest Nitschke and settle in La Grange.

Victoria Jalufka Orsak

Vickie's paternal grandparents Ferdinand Reček and Aneska Macha and her father Jan Reček immigrated on August 10, 1881 from Frenstat #156. Also on board were Jan's siblings: Františka, Amalie, Anežka and Anna. They settled in Lavaca County.

Jan Reček would marry Magdalena Krahulik. She was born onboard the ship: *Berlin* as it landed in Baltimore on May 2, 1871 (145 YEARS AGO). Magdalena traveled with her parents Jan and Františka Krahalik and her siblings Wilhelm, Josef, Rudolph, Franz and Josefa.

Jan and Magalena Reček's daughter Marie would marry Rudolph Jalufka in Texas. Their fifth child was Victoria Jalufka who married Bennie Orsak. Rudolph's parent Augustin Jalufka and Johanna Broz were neighbors in Mniši. Augustin was from house #24 and Johanna was from house #22. They immigrated to Texas on the ship *Rugia* on June 18, 1884. The ship began in Hamburg and delivered them to New York where they then had to travel to Lavaca County, Texas where they settled.

Bennie Orsak

Bennie's father Ludwig Orsak immigrated with his parents Vinc and Rosalie Zapalač Orsak and sisters Alzbeta, Frantiska and Vincie on the *Frankfurt* to Galveston, Texas arriving on August 15, 1903 from Novy Hrozenkov, Vsetin district, Moravia. They first settled in Fayette County, then moved to Lavaca County and finally settled in Wharton County, Texas.

His great grandmother Mariana Konařik Zapalač and his grandfather, Stepan Zapalač, immigrated on the *Oder* through New York on November 27, 1882 from Novy Hrozenkonv #424. Also onboard were Stepan's siblings: Anna, Jan, Rozina, Josef and Pavel.

Ryza Family: Melissa Shafer Reifke

Melissa's grandfather František Ryza left Horni Lidec, Kromeriz District, Moravia on August 25, 1882 from Bremen, Germany and arrived on September 15, 1882 in Baltimore. His wife, Katerina Filak Ryza immigrated on the *Koln* and arrived in New Orleans on August 17, 1882 bringing children Franz and Katerina with her. They settled in Fayette County, Texas. Their son Franz would marry Marie Stancik in Fayette County. She immigrated from Austria on the *Koln* arriving August 7, 1882 into New Orleans. Franz and Marie Ryza had a son, Emil who married Annie Trlicik. Melissa's mother Grace Ryza Shafer was born to Emil and Annie.

Members of The John Majek Family

Leo Majek, Sr. left Slavkov, Czechoslovakia and boarded the *S.S. Cassel*. He arrived in Galveston on March 12, 1914 and his wife Rosie, along with children Julius and Mary, arrived May 14, 1914 in Galveston on the last ship to leave Europe before the start of World War I. They first settled in Cameron, Milam County and in 1940 moved to Corpus Christi, Nueces County, Texas where children John, Leo, Jr. Charles, Frank, and Joe were born. Leo set about establishing and leading the Leo Majek Orchestra which is still going strong after almost 120 years.

Andrew Patrick Pfertner & Patrick Frank Pfertner (They were not able to attend.)

Their ancestors: Peregrin Fiser and Filomena Vacek Fiser arrived in Texas in 1876 from Vermeřovice on the ship *S. S. Hannover*. They settled in Fayette County and produced a large family.

TCHCC we will now recognize any descendants for any year because immigration stopped after 1920. The Immigration Restriction Act of 1921 limited immigrants by a quota system based on ethnicity. Please submit your ancestors' information for next year's festivities. TCHCC will be celebrating twenty years since it was incorporated and this will be a very special year. Immediately following the Immigrant Certificate Ceremony all were invited outside to particiate in recognition of the new stone that was placed on the Immigrant Wall. A wreath was laid on the Immigrant Wall to honor all the immigrants (center). Judge Ed Janecka and 2016 Miss Texas Czech Slovak Monika Cavanagh and her Little Sister Katie Hyzak placed the wreath (left). Bill Raley and Danny Hughes are pictured next to their ancestors' plaque "Florian and Veronika Frnka, Roznov pod Radhostem to Vox Populi, Texas 1870" (right). They were recognized by TCHCC President Retta Chandler.



Remembering Rev. Frank C. Vagner

Czech priest Rev. Frank C. Vagner came to the US after spending time in a German concentration camp where he ministered the refugees. He was born in Vrbcany, District of Kolin and attended the seminary in Prague from 1924-1934 where he taught at the Theological Faculty of Charles University until Nazi Germany abolished it.

He spent years in the Valka Concentration Camp near Neurenberg, Germany and Babenhausen in Hessen, Germany until he was able to immigrate to the US in 1954. With the help of the Catholic Committee for Refugees in New York he was relocated to the Diocese of Corpus Christi, Texas.

He was assigned to various parishes, orphanages and nursing homes throughout the Corpus Christi Dioces until he retired in 1967. He died on May 30, 1975 and is buried in the Rose Hill Memorial Park, Corpus Christi, Nueces County, Texas.

An organization in Prague that deals with human rights of expatriats is wishing to communicate with anyone who would have known him personally while he lived in Texas. His parish assignments are listed below, along with a picture of him with Cardinal Josef Beran. **If you or anyone you know remembers him,** please contact TCHCC and we will give you the contact information needed that will tell the life story of this remarkable priest.

The Gravesite of Jan Hruska Submitted by Jan Hruska Couch

My great grandfather was Stepan Hruska^{*}. Stepan Hruska b. 7/21/1848 in Jablunka, Moravia d. 5/26/1889 in Hruskaville, TX. He immigrated with his wife and their two oldest daughters on the Bark *Erna* arriving in Galveston 12/23/1881. The family lived with relative by marriage, Jan Hruska, and his wife Katerina Hruska in Ross Prairie for eight years before eventually settling in east Bell County. Stepan established the Hruskaville Store at the southeast corner of what is now Highway 53 and Hruskaville Road east of Temple. That area became known as Hruskaville.

The story of how great grandfather Stepan comes to be buried in a single grave at the first curve in Hruskaville Road south of Highway 53 was told to me by my father, John Joe Hruska, as we tended the grave. The story my father told me is that a patron of the Hruskaville Store was paying unwanted attention to one of Stepan's daughters and he didn't heed Stepan's warnings to stop. The patron and my great grandfather arranged to meet at the corner just south of the store to "settle the matter" in the east Bell County version of a duel. My father was told that his great grandfather rode to the corner on a horse drawn wagon and the patron rode up on horseback with his gun already drawn. He shot Stepan to death before great grandfather could raise his gun. The Hruska family buried Stepan at the corner where he died. According to my father, the authorities were not notified of the shooting until someone from the area went to the county seat on business at a later date. My father's comment was that Czechs in east Bell County took care of their business themselves without getting the law involved. I was never told the identity of the shooter.

My father and mother tended the grave until they were ill and no longer able to do so. The old iron fence that the Hruska family originally erected to protect the headstone and footstone was hit and mangled by mowing equipment, farm equipment and vehicles through the years. The hackberry tree growing near the headstone appears to be the only reason the headstone and foot stone were not also destroyed. At one time my father said there was a group of wooden crosses in the field just past his grandfather's headstone and when those crosses rotted and fell down, they were just plowed under and forgotten. He often said he didn't want his grandfather to be forgotten.

The Lesikar family recently rehabilitated the gravesites of three Lesikar children at the edge of a nearby field. Those tombstones were so badly damaged over time that they had to be replaced. The Lesikar family did the work themselves, but Richard Lesikar gave me contact information for a contractor in Bell County who does similar restorations. The contractor was not able to salvage the heavy old fence around the gravesite but he was able to reset the headstone and foot stone in a concrete slab to protect them from further damage.

I feel gratified that I have followed through on my father's intention to preserve and maintain his grandfather's burial place. For info on how to reach the contractor, contact me at jkcouch@hotmail.com

Recent Presentations at TCHCC

Many Texas Czechs who are searching for their ancestors hit a roadblock when they try to decipher the Czech family records that are online. Although they can view the birth, marriage and death records in the various regions with the "matriky" provided, they find it difficult to read the German script that is present in many of the records. Victor Havel and Robert Janak to the rescue!

Victor Havel of Ennis, Texas spent more than twenty years in Germany during his career. Robert Janak has spent his adult life researching Czech ancestry and records. Robert has also published more than twenty books related to genealogy. Many of these were printed by the Czech Heritage Society of Texas.

They came together to provide information regarding the old German handwriting that was used in church records in the Czech Lands in the early nineteenth century. Pasrticipants enjoyed instruction and hands-on help throughout the day. Not only did Robert and Victor help individuals, they left handouts of their presentations for those who need some help with this "quest". "How Kolaches Came to Texas" was a lecture tour that featured Baylor University Keston Scholar Alice Lunakova of Prague, Czech Republic. Miss Lunakova visited several cites in Texas including TCHCC on August 14, 2016. She shared the results of research she conducted last summer, while a student at Masaryk University in Brno, Czech Republic. She gave an enthusiastic and animated presentation of her final thesis on the history of Czech immigration to Texas in the nineteenth century.

Lunakova explained why she chose to study Texas Czechs. "The motivation for writing about this topic originates from my two extended stays in Texas. First, I studied for one semester at McLennan Community College in Waco in 2014 with the exchange program offered by the English Department of Faculty of Education at Masaryk University. Their striking pride of being of Czech ancestry raised my interest in learning more about the history of their ancestors. After coming home and starting to research the available sources, I could not find any particularly useful literature as sources of reference, and therefore I decided to return to Texas in the following year. This enabled me to undertake my research at the Library of Baylor University, visit Czech museums and heritage centers, attend the traditional mass at the Praha Feast, and enabled me to meet many Czech descendants who were more than willing to share with me their personal experiences," she said.

"Thanks to this opportunity, I not only learned about the remarkable history of thousands of the Czechs who settled in Texas, but I was also able to visit the local towns that once used to be the thriving Czech communities, see the Czech signs at the shops and streets, enter the Czech bakeries to smell and taste the renowned kolaches, attend the Czech festivals, and last but not least, to speak with the Czech descendants whose enthusiasm when speaking of their ancestors amazed me."
