



Edward Janecka was born on a farm in Dubina, in the eastern part of Fayette County. Edward (Ed) was the great, great, grandson of one of the founders of the first Czech community of Texas: Dubina. He attended Bishop Forest High School in Schulenburg and has two degrees from Sam Houston University. Ed served his country in Vietnam and afterward began working in Houston and starting a family with his wife, Margie. They have five children and six grandchildren.



In the late 1970s, he and his family returned to his roots in Dubina to raise his family. Ed's focus on keeping his Czech ancestor's traditions alive was at first centered around the Sts. Cyril and Methodius Catholic Church in Dubina, where he literally grew up next to and still worships and resides nearby.

The first Czech settlers, after arriving in Galveston, traveled inland and found shelter under the large oaks just north of the Navidad River in present-day eastern Fayette County. The immigrants decided to stay in the area and founded a community they called Dubina; "dub" in Czech is oak.

Ed relates that "They brought their faith with them and founded a church. Atop their first church, built in 1877, was an iron cross made by a freed slave and blacksmith named Tom Lee. That church was destroyed by a hurricane in 1909. Lee's cross still tops the present church, completed in 1911, with brilliant colors and beautiful artwork adorning the walls".

In the mid-1900s, it was decided to paint over the joyful decorations with white paint. As an altar boy, Ed Janecka noticed that there seemed to be shapes and possibly colors beneath the sterile white walls and asked his Dad about it; who told him what had happened. After Ed's return from the city life, he successfully led the restoration efforts to return the church to its former beauty and personally painted the angels on the ceiling. This triggered restoration efforts of other churches in the area resulting in the famed Painted Churches of Fayette County.

Ed Janecka has always been one of those people that step up to the plate when leadership is needed. Seeing a need for local leadership in the county, Ed successfully ran for Fayette County Judge in 1990, began serving in 1991 and retired on December 31, 2018.

Most people do not understand that being a County Judge involves more, a lot more, than sitting on a bench and dispensing justice to people who have run afoul of the law. During his tenure as "Judge Ed" he was instrumental in modernizing the county's infrastructure and attracting economic development, while maintaining its quality of life. He successfully worked hard in bringing a Blinn College Extension campus to Schulenburg. Like his Church, he initiated the process of renovating and restoring the historic Fayette County courthouse and the placement of service flags at the Veterans' Memorial on the courthouse grounds. In addition to a listing of fallen Fayette County men on display in the courthouse, he compiled and published a book documenting local WWII veterans. His further efforts to help the servicemen resulted in a Veterans Clinic being established in La Grange.

Ed's upbringing taught him to never destroy anything that can be reused which led to the first countywide recycling program in the state of Texas. When the famous Piano Bridge over the East Navidad River was threatened to be replaced, Ed initiated the efforts to have it restored. He played an important role in establishing a groundwater conservation district in addition and helped block the Trans-Texas Corridor. When the 9-1-1 technology became available, he oversaw the implementation of this life saving advancement. This resulted in new signage for the country roads; hating to discard the many old county road signs, he instituted a program to identify the location of the old one room schoolhouses (over 100) and have them marked using the back side of the county road signs. Ed's rural upbringing led him in assisting in the founding of an animal shelter. The founding of the Fayette Regional Air Center was another accomplishment. As County Judge he exercised excellent leadership during multiple natural disasters in protecting the county.

Ed, always proud of and touting the many contributions of the Czech culture to Texas, played an important role in locating the Texas Czech Heritage and Cultural Center in La Grange.

This all came about in 1995 during a meeting of the Texans of Czech Ancestry (TOCA). They met in Temple to address the need for preserving Czech heritage and culture by establishing a statewide cultural center. TOCA is an umbrella organization with members that represented Czech-related groups, namely, the KJT, KJZT, SPJST, RVOS, SOKOL, CESAT, CEFT, CHS, Bexar County CHS, Travis-Williamson County CHS, and McLennan-Hiil CHS.

Judge Ed and Carolyn Heinsohn, President of the Czech Heritage Society of Texas, attended the meeting. At the meeting Robert Janak and Eugene Labay presented proposals for a Texas Czech Library/Archives/ Cultural Center. Judge Ed proposed that in addition to a library and archives, there should also be a museum and Czech village.

The Texans of Czech Ancestry voted to spearhead a project to build a center. The scope and location were to be decided by their representatives. After a year of planning, press releases were sent out for a call to communities that would assist in developing a Czech Center that would preserve the heritage, culture, traditions, artifacts, architecture, fine arts, and artisan skills of the Czechs. A center that would have a library, a museum, a meeting center, and land for restored buildings. Four cities, Caldwell, Ennis, La Grange and Temple responded. Judge Ed began working with La Grange's city government leaders, Mayor Don Chovanec, the Chamber of Commerce, and business leaders to present the best offer.

Through his efforts, La Grange was selected as the location of the proposed Czech center. Following the selection, he remained a behind-the-scene supporter of the efforts to raise the money to develop the Texas Czech Heritage and Cultural Center in La Grange, Texas, into this shining tribute to the thirteen families that suffered through the winter of 1856 under some oak trees in Central Texas.

Tony Janak, who led the Tony Janak Orchestra for over 50 years, was a main stay in the southern Central Texas polka music arena. He not only played music for six decades, but managed the Sweet Home Community Center, which, thanks to him and his wife Alice, is still providing a weekly great dance experience.

Tony got his start playing drums in his early teens with the Janak Family Band. In high school and beyond, Tony and two of his buddies, Lynnwood Berger and Raymond Bordovsky were the Sweet Home Playboys, whose gigs were playing for tips at the seven beer joints around Sweet Home. In 1958, Tony and some of his Playboys began playing with the George Machart Band of Hallettsville which traveled around the Victoria, Fayette, and Lavaca Counties.

In 1963, Tony formed his own band, the Tony Janak Orchestra. Original band members were Tony, Joe Jansky, Rudy Petru, Harlan Hasse, and Bobby Dornak. Hubert Janak joined his brother to play country and dance music for many years. Other local musicians, such as Leroy Rybak, passed through Tony's Orchestra and went on to form or play in other bands. Members of the band over its span included Elroy Sternadel, Doc Darilek, Darryl Neubauer, Harry Macik, Ronnie Bruns, Betty Chumchal, Dennis Chumchal, Edward Malik, David Hickle, Paul Janak, James Honish, Ronnie Riske, Donnie Riske, Joe Martinez, Charlie Welfl, Victor Welfl, Albert Koether, Larry Mayer, and Bobby Fajkus.

The Tony Janak Orchestra celebrated their 50th anniversary and retirement on New Year's Eve 2008 at Sweet Home Hall. The Tony Janak Orchestra made five records through the years, one of which was On the Road Again that describes their playing schedule across the state. The final was a compilation of formerly recorded songs and entitled 40 Year Anniversary 2003.

Those attending dances at Sweet Home Community Center over the years have seen Tony, and his wife, Alice, selling tickets and welcoming everyone. Tony's son, Mark, continued the family tradition of booking the bands for this "Music City" and recently sold the hall to four local young men, keeping the tradition local and alive.

The probability of keeping a group of musicians playing music for five decades is challenging, however, Benny Okruhlik, with the help of his wife, Earline, have made it so. This musical journey began in 1970. At a family reunion, Benny Okruhlik, James Ohnheiser, Harry Macik and E. J. Macik were sitting around jamming with a few other members with instruments. This was the tail-end of a time period when Czech musicians were plentiful and family reunions well attended.

The aforementioned thought that they had the seeds of a band, and realizing they needed a few more members to fill out their sound, they reached out to Hubert Janak, E.J. Macik,



Wes Matus, and Dennis Fajkus. As they all lived in Houston at the time, they named themselves the City Polka Boys. The members were Benny Okruhlik on Accordion and Vocals, Hubert Janak on Rhythm Guitar and Vocals, James Ohnheiser on Trumpet and Vocals, Harry Macik on Tuba, Bass Guitar and Vocals, Dennis Fajkus on Saxophones and Vocals, Wesley Matus on Trumpet and Lead Guitar.

Brothers E. J. and Harry Macik and first cousin Wesley Matus, grew up on neighboring farms in Baylor County (West Texas) and all played in the Seymour School Band System. Benny Okruhlik, James Ohnheiser and Dennis Fajkus grew up in Fayette County while Hubert Janak was from Lavaca County. As young men in their 20s, all had landed jobs in Houston.

E. J., Hubert and Wesley lived together in the same two bedroom rent house for a period of time in Houston. Polka records were frequently on the stereo as was attendance at the Saturday night polka dances at the Bill Mraz Ballroom on 835 West 34th Street in North Houston.

The Maciks had family ties to Fayette County and as was common in Central Texas, family relationships were frequent. Harry's brother-in-law was James Ohnheiser. James' sister Vernell and Benny's wife were first cousins. James Ohnheiser and Dennis Fajkus played together as teen-agers in Schulenburg with a group of musicians that in time formed into the wellknown Telstars Band which has reached its 50th anniversary and are still playing.

After the family reunion jam session, the young energetic guys got to know each other's love of playing polka music and their ability to each play a combination of instruments; it just all fell into place. There were a lot of practice sessions in someone's garage. The St. Theresa Catholic Church was looking for a band to play at the church fundraiser and someone mentioned this group of guys who are getting pretty good, yet never had played in public before. The guys were hired for the princely amount of all their refreshments and food furnished, no cash. They were a big hit with the crowd which led to bookings at family related events.

The name (City Polka Boys) originated just as the Jimmy Brosch and his Happy Country Boys band was getting very popular. Since all seven musicians were from the country, but now living in the city (Houston), they called themselves the City Polka Boys. The big break came when Mr. Bill Mraz had the young band audition at his hall. He was pleased and offered two bookings. The Mraz bookings continued for several years at usually ten or so jobs per year. That was definitely the best and most fun place to play as it was a gathering place for their friends and relatives. After Bill Mraz passed away, his son Gene took over.

One particular night when handing over the pay, he made a comment that whenever the City Polka Boys play there, he sells more beer!

Two LP records were recorded with the original seven members. The first in 1971 with the title of the lead song "Long Road to Houston" (polka). This was a new song that received a lot of air play over the polka radio shows. A second original song was "The Gifted Ring" (waltz). The Moravians band of Ennis has just recently released a recording with this song on it.

The second recording was produced in Dallas at a live performance in 1973. A period of time later, Dennis Fajkus went through a job transfer and no longer performed with the band. Another recording was made in Schulenburg in 1977, but only as an 8-track tape. It included an original song written by Hubert Janak titled "Joe Patek Is Still The King". It was a remake of the Waylon Jennings song "Bob Wills Is Still The King". The Vrazels produced a recording with a great version of the song with added lyrics.

#### City Polka Boys, continued

A fourth recording was done in 1981 at a Studio in Houston "Cookin' Texas Music". On it was a recreation of the Joe Patek Orchestra original song titled "Hills of Shiner" (polka). This song is still very popular to this date. The Czechaholics have recorded a very similar version of the song. Another favorite on that recording is the ever-popular song "It Took Me All Night (To Get Home Last Night)".

The remaining six members performed until the mid-1980s when changes then occurred. The City Polka Boys kept the original line-up intact for over thirty years with only a few changes. Bennie's brother, Ernie, joined the band on trumpet, sax, and keyboards and strengthened the family sound.

Around the year 2000, the band decided to change their name for business reasons, a sign of the times of polka music popularity. Texas Sound Check was the new name for the same guys playing basically the same music for thirty years. The Band continues to be a favorite dance band in Central Texas.

HELP! WHERE DO I BEGIN IN RESEARCHING MY ANCESTORS?

1. Begin with your parents and trace your lineage backwards to find the names and birth/death dates of your earliest relatives.

2. All records are by counties, so find out what county your ancestors lived in. A visit to the county seat or county library will result in early tax records, marriage records, wills, etc.

3. The census contains great information. All censuses are online at www.libraryoftexas.org through their Tex-Share Database. Become a patron of your local library and obtain your TexShare Login ID. Once on the site, choose Heritage Quest, select the year and browse the collection by state and counties, then precinct numbers or town names.

4. If you do not know or cannot find your ancestors' village of origin, our Melnar Library resources can help you.

PAINTING OF KARLSTEJN CASTLE DONATED TO TCHCC

In January of 2007, David Barta painted a beautiful mural of Karlstejn Castle from a photo he took on a visit to the Czech Republic. Mr. Barta donated the mural to the Harris County Chapter of Czech Heritage Society of Texas. The mural was enjoyed by the chapter until 2019 when they vacated the building in which it hung. Mr. Barta wished to donate it to TCHCC and it was brought to LaGrange in September. where it now hangs in the Melnar Library. Pictured left to right: Anna Krpec, Frank Svrcek, J.G. Also donated to the center was a whimsical kids Fish Pond and a Photo-Op Board depicting a Moravian couple in their kroje. The boards were used annually at the Chapter's Czech SpringFest and will now be used during TCHCC's festivals.

#### Karlstejn Mural History

The mural by David F. Barta was painted on Louan plywood using acrylic water base paints and photos as a guide to replicate the image and surroundings. Many hours were spent in his garage at Deer Park to complete the painting to honor his Czech parents, ancestors and our Czech heritage.

The Barta family is originally from Frenstat pod Radhostem, Moravia, and immigrated to Fayette County in 1870 and settled in Ammansville, Texas. Frantisek, the youngest son, was born in Frenstat lived on their farm in Dubina. In 1919, his family sold the farm and moved to Wallis, Austin County, Texas. The family included ten children. The three older girls were married, four younger ones were still in their youth, anr four boys remained at home. Alfons, Joseph, Bohumil and Victor stayed on the farm for a few years and helped with the farm work.

In 1937, Bohumil married Anastasia Rita Jurek, the daughter of Edmund and Frances Chalupa Jurek of Wallis. The Jurek family emigrated in 1880 from Ticha, Moravia and settled in Fayette County.

The Bohumil Barta family had five children – Eugene, David (the artist), Bernice, Charlie and Gloria.
